### 2017-2022 Business Plan

Since the year of incorporation (2012), AAC has matured, board members and provincial institutes have acquired more knowledge of national and provincial issues faced by the agrology profession. A governance structure and a part time general manager are in place to ensure sound operations and project management. In the renewed Business Plan, the board realigned its mission and direction under three strategic objectives to: 1) Competency based approach to the practice of agrology 2) Recognition and promotion of the agrology profession and 3) Governance and national presence. Upon the renewed engagement of member institutes in a Memorandum of Understanding (M.O.U.) to adopt a **National Standard for Entry to Practice in the Agrology Profession in Canada**, the key objective for 2017 will be recommendations on a National Entry-to-Practice Education Standard and an implementation plan over the next 3 to 5 years.

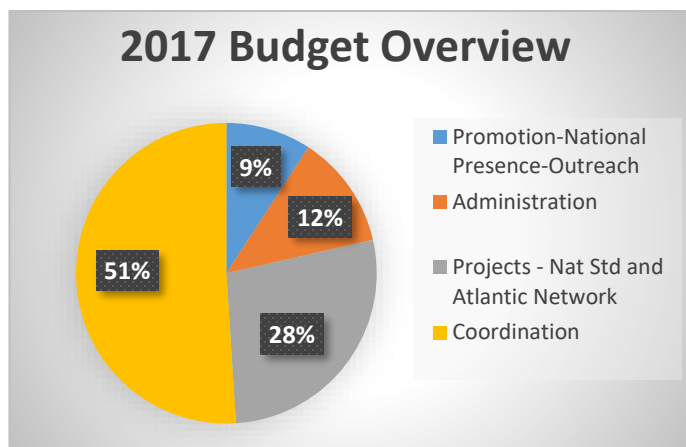
### 2017 Action Plan and Budget Forecast

In 2017, five (5) key projects are on the dashboard for the General Manager and AAC project teams:

- 1) **National Education Standard:** An Ad-hoc Committee comprised of representatives of each provincial institute will be tasked to assist Agrologists-Agronomes Canada and perform a review of and

information about the entry-to-practice education standard. Outcomes will be recommendations on the national education standard and options for implementation.

- 2) **Atlantic Network:** Continue to support the four (4) Atlantic Institutes in the development and adoption of a 3Yr Plan to advance the agrology profession in the Atlantic Region;
- 3) **Promote the National Education Standard:** Upon completion of the national standard project, launch a promotion campaign to inform target audiences; (membership, Academia, provincial Governments, Labor Mobility Coordinators);
- 4) **National Presence with stakeholders:** Participate at national consultations and tables about agriculture and environment issues and be known as the voice of agrologists in Canada;
- 5) **Student Outreach Program:** Launch a pilot project in partnership with selected institutes and universities to evaluate best practices on how to engage students in adopting the value of their future professional designation.



### Atlantic Network Project: For Advancing the Agrology Profession in Atlantic Region

The project Steering Committee was officially created at the end of July 2016. Members are: Gary Bishop, President Elect-NLIA; Stéphanie Cormier, President-NBIA; Michael Devaney, Councillor-NSIA; Earl Pickard, Chair-PEIIA. Laurie Eagles-NSIA acts as the Project Lead with Suzanne Laplante in support.

In September, a management consultant, Simeon Roberts, was hired to develop recommendations for advancing agrology in the Atlantic. He interviewed representatives of each institute and did a thorough review of the institute's status. (ie: Acts, Bylaws, Processes, membership evolution, etc...). At a face-to-face meeting on October 21<sup>st</sup> in Bible Hill, NS, the committee shared views on the future of the profession and the findings of the consultant. They were able to clearly identify areas of cooperation that would benefit each institute and their membership such as: continuous professional development, education credentials assessment tools, administrative functions.

On November 25<sup>th</sup>, the consultant will table a draft strategy for the creation of an Atlantic Agrology Network. The steering committee will review the strategy on December 5<sup>th</sup> in Moncton, NB, then committee members will bring the proposed strategy back to their councils and members to seek their engagement. Meanwhile, Laurie is assisting the committee members in presenting the project their council to ensure consistency and understanding. The project is progressing on schedule and on budget.
